Ed Kilgore Lyon County Undersheriff said the Sheriff will be available for the next meeting to provide a report. He said he was available for questions. There were none.

3.2 Reports by City Staff, City Council and the Mayor, including but not limited to monthly statistical reports by city departments.

Mayor Roy Edgington said he went to the northern Nevada Development meeting where the county managers all gave a report. Single family dwellings are still being built but not as fast as we need. Northern Nevada appears to be recovering better than Southern Nevada due to the lack of tourism. Unemployment in Nevada is below the national average, but Clark County is above the national average. 40% of unemployed people according to a survey, said they aren't working because they retired. 1% was due to COVID and 3.5% was due to lack of childcare. Net worth has gone up largely due to the increase cost of houses. Fernley has a small inventory of homes struggling to keep up with demand.

Councilman Torres reported that the dementia friendly event was cancelled due the high numbers of Covid. It will be rescheduled, and the Fernley Senior Citizen Advisory Committee Meeting will be February 11th in the City Chambers at 9am.

Councilwoman McKay added that one of the meetings she went to with the mayor reported there were 96 ships in the Los Angeles harbor waiting to unload which explains the many empty shelves around Fernley.

City manager Daphne Hooper reported that the city has transitioned to a new system so anyone interested in seeing the city reports and agendas need to sign back up to be notified when they are posted. People can contact the City Clerk's Office or the City

Manager's office for assistance signing up with NotifyMe. On February 4th from 5-7pm there is an Art event that is free to the public. The January Community Development report has been published on the City's website as well as the City of Fernley Winter newsletter.

Billy Staten Building Official for the City presented the January Metrics. He reported Code enforcement and building officials were sworn in by Councilman Torres.

5. PRESENTATIONS

5.1. State of the City by Mayor Roy Edgington

Mayor Roy Edgington presented the State of the City. He said Fernley has come a long way in the last 10 years. Currently the city has \$12.8 M in the general fund and has proven to be financially responsible. City has adjusted to the pandemic and continues to grow. As Fernley develops into a more urban community, he has seen how there is a change in priorities that focuses more on the future of Fernley. The city has partnered with many local organizations and businesses to make improvements and grow throughout the years. Public meetings and events have helped to connect the community even through the pandemic while the city transitioned to virtual conferencing. The general fund debt for city Hall has been paid off in the amount of \$1.7 million.

Mayor Edgington stated the council, and city staff is committed to improve the community and the lives of the citizens.

5.2. Presentation and discussion by Nikki Bryan, Lyon County Clerk, on secure polling stations, secure ballots, same day voter registration, and automatic DMV Voter Registration.

Nikki Bryan, Lyon County Clerk gave an overview on the history of voting and how the decision was made to use the sequoia voting system.

5.3. (For Possible Action) Yearly Presentation on the City Attorney's Office by City Attorney Brandi Jensen.

City Attorney Brandi Jensen presented this item.

6.1. Consideration and possible direction to staff to process a Zoning Map Amendment for the City-owned property located at 1170 Newlands Drive (APN: 021-211-02).

Tim Thompson Planning Director explained the Zoning map amendment is intended to change the property zoning from SF6 to change it to a Multifamily residential zoning district to bring the property to conformance with the land use in the master plan.

Daphne Hooper City Manager introduced the City Arts & Culture is hosting Murals, music, and margaritas in May, funding has been provided by the Arts & Culture Committee Task Force as well as Sierra NV Arts Foundation. They received 40 artists applications, 17 were selected with 5 alternates. She asked City Council to approve the selections.

Daphne Hooper City Manager provided an update that all NV counties are considered high risk of transmission. Everyone must wear a mask regardless of vaccination status when indoors. State of NV is automatically adopting the recommendation of the CDC. Quarantine time is now 5 days.

7. ITEMS REQUESTED BY MAYOR OR CITY COUNCIL MEMBERS:

Zoberski requested to revisit zoning in Master Plan and land uses since we keep running into issues that are zoned rural. She would like to make sure to keep some of the rural areas rural and preserve the charm of Fernley. She will get together with Daphne and Tim to create a future agenda item.

Mayor requested a future item to look at the Park's master plan and see if staff would take over the motorcycle track at the end of town.

7.1 Discussion and possible action regarding a future agenda item to dissolve Resolution 20-006, Declaring a local State of Emergency for the City of Fernley. (Councilman Torres's Request).

Councilman Torres expressed that Covid 19 no longer constitutes an emergency being two years through the pandemic now, with the peak of Omicron having come and gone so the City of Fernley should look at dissolving the resolution. He pointed out the resolution has already expired anyway from the State.

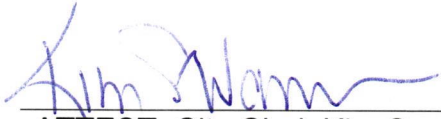

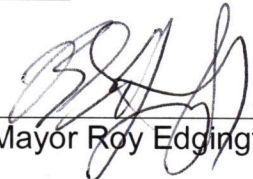

Introduction

2021 was a very eventful year for North Lyon County Fire Protection District. COVID continued to surge through our community, 9-1-1 calls reached their highest number ever, personnel came and went, and the District continued to provide exceptional service to the community.

We pride ourselves on always maintaining the **PEOPLE FIRST** approach. Our goals and objectives for 2021 centered on the continued growth of a **PEOPLE FIRST** service.

I am proud to report that we achieved the goals set out in the 2021 strategic plan. The goals were:

Reduce the risk of injury or death whether by fire, medical emergency, or combination that residents and visitors to our community face daily. We accomplished this goal specifically by focusing directly on the reduction of response times to meet the National standard expectations. We also achieved this goal through the addition of three new firefighter/EMS provider positions which allowed us to expand response capabilities.

Improve District operational performance by utilizing known industry best practices and the appropriate collection and use of operational data. We aim to become data driven in operational design and deployment. We accomplished this goal by hiring a full-time employee with the specific responsibility to perform Quality Improvement and Quality Assurance and by implementing flexible staffing designs that provide for more dedicated response to emergencies.

Expand and further develop the District budgetary process to identify and capture additional funding streams thus allowing for achievement of the previously listed goals. We accomplished this goal in part through the addition of our QA/QI employee that improved ambulance billing that captured at least an additional \$40,000 in previously unrealized revenue. We implemented a purchasing policy that streamlined and centralized purchasing authority and responsibility. We added electronic control over our vehicle fuel supply that monitors and assists the District to better maintain our fleet of vehicles and apparatus.

Coordinate, engage, and strengthen external and internal relationships. We accomplished this goal through our continued community involvement in all community activities. We hosted several large events at Fire Station 61 including the 9-11 Commemoration, two funerals, and several charity breakfast activities. The District also entered two significant MOU relationships during 2021. The first with the City of Fernley, and second with our neighboring agencies relating to responses along the I-80 corridor.

All in all, 2021 was an exciting and busy year for North Lyon Fire. The following information is a snapshot of our performance, experiences, and activities that took place during the past year.

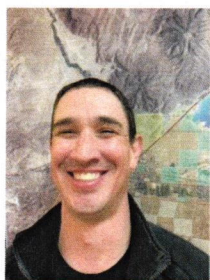

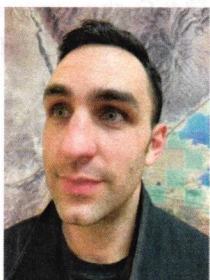

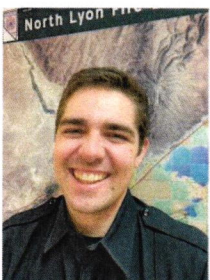
New full-time personnel

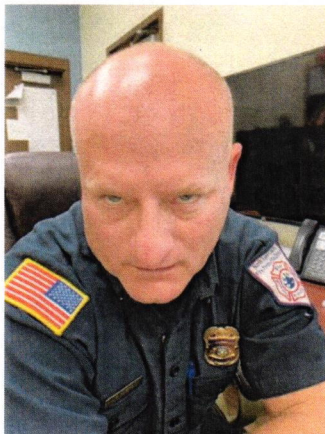
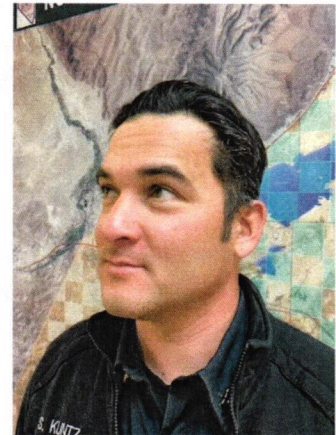
Promotions

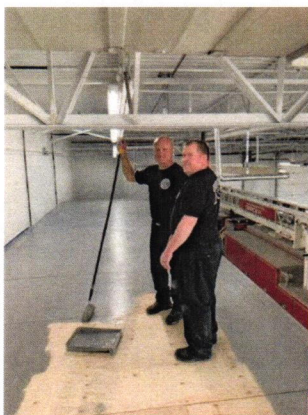

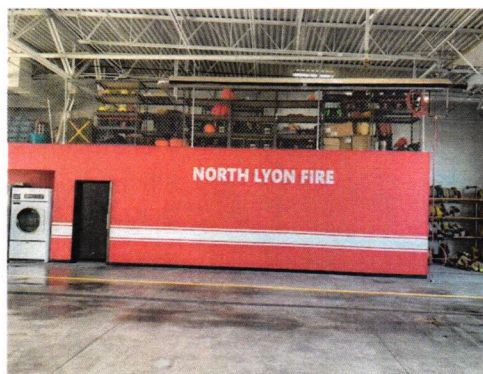

The Events



Although started at the end of 2020, the new Bunker Room project at station 61 was completed. This addition to the station allowed us to keep all of our firefighting PPE in one location for storage and is in a negative pressure room that vents all off-gassing directly out of the building. This is a significant improvement for firefighter safety and is highly recommended as one step to prevent carcinogenic exposure in the workplace. The majority of the work was done in house with almost every member working a hammer, saw, or paintbrush.



North Lyon Fire received the first two new engines in over 24 years with the arrival of our twin Pierce Enforcer engines. This project had been underway for well over a year upon their arrival and have drastically improved service delivery and firefighter safety. Interestingly, the engines were involved in their first fire when a building being used for training on the new engines caught fire during a training exercise.

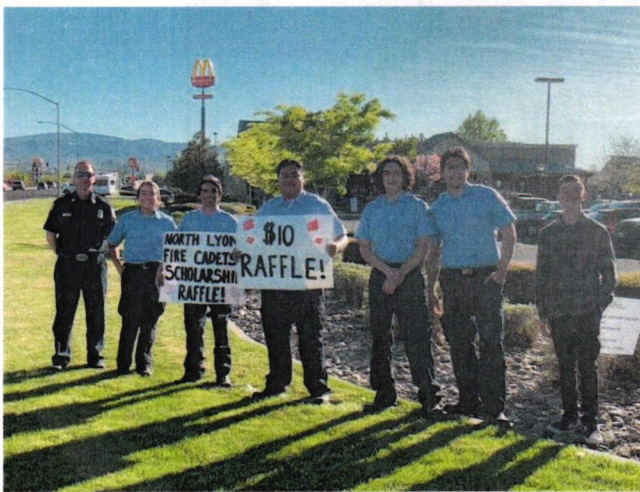
One of the engines is dedicated to the lifelong support from the Carr family and is lovingly named "Linda". On March 2, the engines were dedicated, and a ceremonial pushing was held with over 500 community members present to celebrate this monumental occasion.



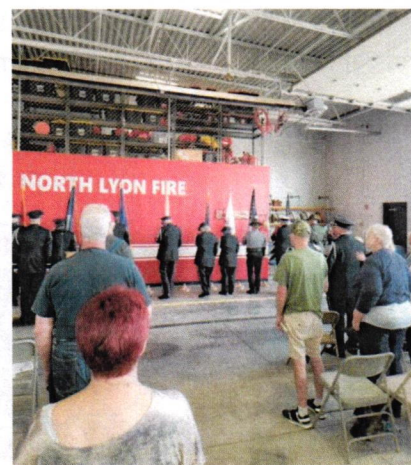


On May 15, we held our First Annual Cadet Scholarship Golf Tournament. After a rousing beginning to the day, golf was cut short by torrential rain and dramatic lightening on the golf course. Although we didn't get to complete a full round of golf, the tournament raised over \$22,000 for the Cadet program.

Thanks to the generosity of the community and participants, we were able to fund almost \$8,000 in senior year scholarships. The second annual tournament is now scheduled for early June 2022.



2021 marked the 20th commemoration of the 9-11 attacks and the loss of 343 firefighters at the World Trade Center in New York. North Lyon Fire partnered with the Nevada Veteran's Coalition to host a Commemoration Ceremony at Station 61. Over 500 people attended the somber ceremony and paid tribute to the heroic sacrifices of that day.



We participated in several Halloween events this year and in doing so, passed out over 300 pounds of candy. The District dressed as the Winnie the Pooh gang and visited several schools and local businesses in costume. A great time was had by all.



Christmas time is always busy for North Lyon Fire. This year we participated in three major events. First was the Grinch breakfast hosted at Station 61. We helped to provide breakfast and an opportunity to growl with the Grinch to over 300 people. The following week, Santa arrived in town atop a fire Engine and the annual Christmas for Kids Breakfast and Toy Drive was hosted at Station 61. The District also assisted the Grinch and Santa in the Main Street Christmas Parade.



The Scenes

On 03/28/2021 Engine 61 was dispatched to a camper trailer fire on Mesa Drive. On arrival the Crew reported flames and smoke coming from a small camp trailer next to an outbuilding garage. The crews engaged in a quick offensive attack and quickly began overhaul of the trailer. During overhaul the Crew discovered a victim inside the trailer. Nevada State Fire Marshal Investigators were called in and conducted the fatality investigation. Due to the extensive fire damage from the rapidly moving and exceptionally hot fire, no determination was made about cause of the fire and cause of death for the victim.



On 06/17/21 Engine 61 and Rescue 61 were dispatched with Central Lyon Fire units to a rollover accident on US95 just south of Damon's Curve. Upon arrival, Crews found a small pickup that had rolled over multiple times and was approximately 150 feet off of the roadway. The single occupant was seriously injured and required extrication to be removed from the vehicle. A medical helicopter was called in and the patient was transported to a Trauma Center in Reno.

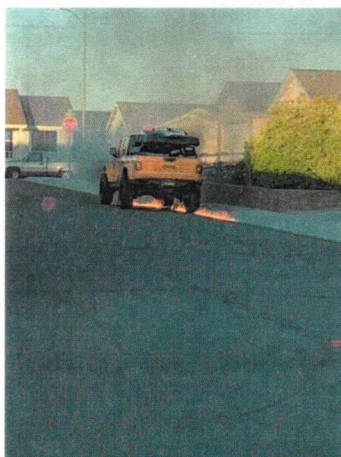


On 06/25/21 all North Lyon Crews were dispatched to a house fire in the highlands south of the Truckee Canal. On arrival Crews found a single-family residence with heavy smoke and flames coming from the front windows of the home. A neighbor reported that there had been a domestic disturbance at the location and that the person responsible for the fire had just walked down the road as fire crews were arriving.

Lyon County Sherriff's were called to the scene to investigate the claim. Crews aggressively attacked the fire and were able to make a good stop on the fire progression keeping much of the home from burning. Fire attack was significantly hindered by the lack of hydrant water in that area, however, the use of multiple water tenders proved successful.

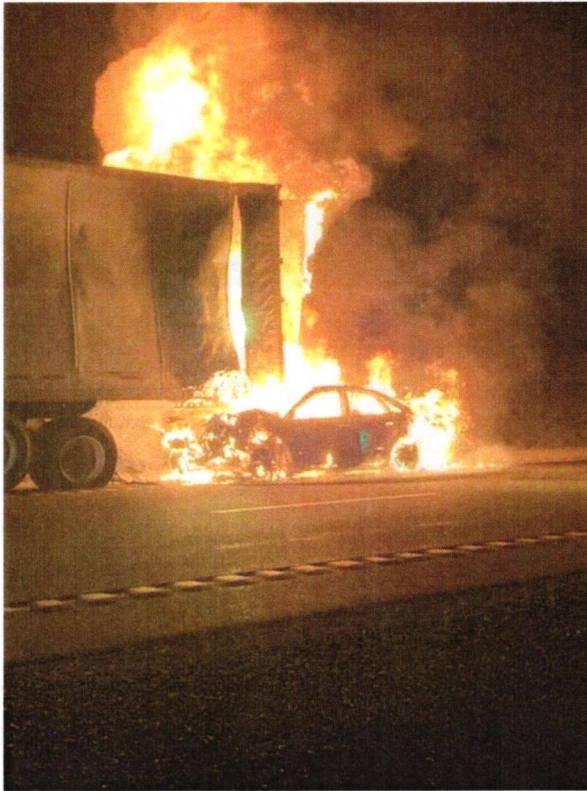


Later that day, Engine 62 was dispatched to a car fire. On arrival, the Crew found a new Jeep heavily involved in fire with flames from gas leakage rolling down the gutter. The vehicle was quickly extinguished, and a faulty electrical component was determined as the cause.



In the early morning hours July 4th, Engine 61 and Rescue 61 were dispatched to a motor vehicle accident on I-80 at MM62. On arrival Crews found a passenger vehicle fully involved in fire. The vehicle had rear-ended a Semi at high speed. Crews made an aggressive fire attack and were able to quickly extinguish the car fire, however the trailer and contents were more difficult due to the lack of hydrant water.

After extinguishment, a single victim was discovered in the passenger vehicle. Investigators were called out but were unable to determine if the victim died due to the accident or from fire related causes.



On 09/03/2021 all North Lyon Fire crews were dispatched to a house fire on C Street. The smoke and flames were visible long prior to arrival due to the intensity of the fire. Upon arrival the Crews determined most of the fire was in the garage section of the home. After an extended and difficult attack, the fire was controlled and kept from destroying the home.

Thankfully, all occupants were able to exit the home and no injuries were reported.



On 9/27/2021 North Lyon Fire crews were dispatched to a structure fire in the highlands, south of the Truckee Canal. Upon arrival crews discovered a single-family residential structure that was fully involved in fire. The crews made a quick defensive attack on the fire but were frequently pushed off the fire-line due to multiple explosions and projectiles coming from the inferno.

The lack of water supplied by hydrants also reduced effectiveness of firefighting operations and multiple water tenders were required to provide support on the incident. The home was in the process of being remodeled by the new owner and luckily was unoccupied at the time of the fire. Firefighting operations lasted well over six hours to gain control of the fire and fully extinguish the flames. State Fire Marshal Investigators were called in and determined the fire was the result of electrical issues.



The Conclusion

It is our honor to serve as members of the North Lyon County Fire Protection District. We take our service to the public serious and will continue to strive towards a better and safer service.

We eagerly look forward to continued progress during 2022. We will be receiving our newest ambulance, which will replace our oldest and highest mileage unit. We are also working on several grants to further our fleet with the addition of a new Type III Engine.

We hope to hire three more firefighters next fiscal year to increase staffing at Station 62 and will promote three new Captains for full supervision and crew leadership at Station 62.

2022 will also include a Voter Question Initiative to increase District stability through a much-needed taxation increase. It has been 30 years since the last successful initiative.
