

**MINUTES OF THE

DECEMBER 4, 2024**

Mayor Neal E. McIntyre called the meeting to order at 5:00 pm.

It looks like there's money grabbing where you're trying to get the fire station and the pool. You have no budget for the community center; and wanted to know what is going on with the garbage contract.

3. REPORTS - this item is for various public entity representatives to provide general information to the Council and public. No action will be taken.

Chief Deputy Mitch Brantingham gave a brief update from the Sheriff's office. The department will be participating in the Fernley Christmas Parade. They have been working on permits and traffic control plans and will be finalizing those things this week. He thanked Kim Swanson and April Homme for all their help in getting all that done. They will be participating at Wreaths Across America at the Veterans Cemetery. The department is actively running some extra traffic enforcement on Hardies Lane during school times and keeping some statistics on what's going on out there. One of the reports they got back from some of the deputies working out there was the inability to conduct effective traffic enforcement because of the congestion and the setup of the street and being able to safely stop vehicles as well as activating lights, without just causing pandemonium out there on the roadway. We are keeping some data on that also, so that we can get a more detailed look at what's going on at that intersection. They are also conducting some additional traffic enforcement down the farm district corridor of the school zones. Deputy Holland, School Resource Officer, is out there working on a couple of special projects for the schools and making sure that we're doing some school zone enforcement out there, particularly as we come into winter. We're coming into the New Year holiday; we are going to be doing a little bit of extra saturation traffic work on those main highway corridors. We haven't seen any uptick in any criminal activity around the city. There have been a couple of large marijuana seizures that the deputies are working on. They are putting out some information regarding the safe keeping of vehicles and packages and property during the holiday season. We are asking folks to make sure they're tracking packages as they're coming to their doors, trying to keep the porch pirating down during this holiday season. We have two open positions, and they are working to have those positions filled by the end of the year.

3.1. Reports by City Staff, City Council, and the Mayor, including but not limited to monthly statistical reports by city departments.

Ben Marchant, City Manager, announced this weekend's holiday activities. The Grinch breakfast will be from 8 am to noon. It has been relocated from the teen center. The Christmas tree lighting will happen immediately following the parade here at City Hall around 6:30 pm, along with Coco-With-The Cops and the sheriff and pictures with Santa and Mrs. Claus. We did get a letter from Waste Management this week. Their contract was extended a year ago for 5 years until 2029. This notice stated that they will be increasing the rate in consistent with the Bureau of Labor Statistics index of 3.79% effective January 1, 2025, and we'll post that so that everyone knows about that.

Nick Vander Poel, Flynn Giudici Government Affairs, gave a brief report on the 2025 Nevada Legislature Senate and Assembly Committee Assignments. The Assembly in 2023 had 13 members, and in 2025 it's going to be 14 members. There are only 5 individuals out of 14 who are returning with previous committee experience. On the Senate side, they grew from 5 members in 2023 to 7 members, and of those individuals, 4 of them are coming back. On Monday, the Economic Forum met, and they projected \$12.4 billion in tax revenue for the next 2 years and this is what the Governor is going to build his budget off of. It's a 7% increase. It was considered a conservative forecast by the Economic Forum. The next Economic Forum will report on May 1, 2025, to see if there's additional revenue. May 2023 Economic forum roughly gave the legislature an extra \$250 million dollars. It sounds like it's a bit of a tight budget. It's going to have to be very thoughtful as it relates to the budget request going forward. The city does have their bill draft request, Senate Bill 70. It is official and will be referred to Senate finance and be able to give a presentation as it relates to our bill draft request for the Community Response and Resource Center.

Councilman Albert Torres reported that all the FSCAC Senior Angels were selected. The Fernley Convention and Tourism Authority (FCTA) meeting is Monday, December 9th at 6:00 pm. The Fernley Senior Citizens Advisory Committee (FSCAC) meeting is Friday, December 13 at 9:00 am.

Mayor Neal E. McIntyre stated that he was sorry that he missed Councilman Joe Mendoza's swearing in.

5. STAFF REPORTS

5.1. Discussion and Possible action to approve a contract with Stantec to Design for the proposed Highway 50 Water Main Loop to prepare plans for the installation of a 14-inch transmission line. The proposal is not to exceed the amount of \$382,929.

6. PRESENTATIONS

6.1. Presentation, discussion and possible action to accept the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report for the year ended June 30, 2024. Presentation by Hinton Burdick, CPAs and Advisors.

Robert Carson, City Treasurer, thanked the finance staff for their hard work over the last year. He especially acknowledged the hard work of Jenny Carrick, our accounting manager. She ran the day-to-day audit, and her hard work, and her attention to detail made this a smooth process. He also thanked the auditors for their work. They were great partners to work with. They were always open to communication and answering questions. He went over some of the changes made from years past. Some of the tables in the Manager's Discussion and Analysis section have been redesigned and condensed to give a more streamlined view of where the city's at. The net values for water rights, intangible assets and infrastructure all used to be lumped together with outside site improvements, and we broke those out for a clear presentation of where we stand with capital assets. He reviewed the notes section had a couple of changes.

R. McKay Hall, audit partner with Hinton Burdick, touched briefly on what it is that auditors do. He talked about what the results of the audits were, looked at a couple of the key indicators, some of the numbers to watch as the counsel or user of the financial statements, and then reviewed some of the 5-year trends for the city. The Independent Auditor's Report for the financial statements can be found on pages one through 3 of the financial statements. It's an unmodified or a clean opinion, which is to say that, based on the test work, the information in the financial statements is materially correct. There's another report on compliance and internal controls over financial reporting. It's on pages 97 and 98. Sometimes it's known as a yellow book report. That report talks a little bit about internal controls. One of the primary focuses of a financial audit is not the internal controls. We are not auditing the internal controls of the organization. However, to determine whether the financial information is materially accurate, we do have to understand what those internal controls are, those processes and procedures that are meant to safeguard the assets and resources of the city, and to use them properly. We do look at them during the audit, in conjunction with the other test work that we performed. There were no material weaknesses or significant deficiencies in this year's audit. There's also a report on State compliance on page 99 and 100. There were no findings there. The city did have over \$750,000 worth of expenditure of Federal monies this year, and so there is a single audit that's required there as well. That was also a clean opinion. No findings related to the single audit. Some of the financial highlights, some of those key numbers to watch are your total assets and deferred outflows, which are much like assets. Like prepaid expenses in many ways, but those total assets and deferred outflows exceeded your liabilities and deferred inflows by \$255 million dollars, and that's your net position, which is basically the equity for the city. The net position increased by \$31.3 million. \$16.8 million of the increase was from business type activities and \$14.4 million was from governmental activities. Total revenues from all sources were \$57.3 million and

the costs for the city programs were \$26.1 million. While the city does have \$255 million in net position, not all of that is spendable. You're looking at more like \$80-\$82 million worth of unrestricted net position. So those are important numbers to watch over time to see how they go. The general fund from fiscal year 2020 through fiscal year 2024, they are trending in a northeasterly direction that's a good trend. The property taxes, which are a primary revenue source for the city, over the last 5 years have been trending in a steady and consistent manner year after year. The Water Fund has been able to run an operating profit over the last 5 years. For the Sewer fund looking at the operating revenues and expenses, there is an operating profit that's been recognized over the last 5 years. The general fund, water fund, and the Sewer fund balances have been increasing over the last year. You have infrastructure included in those fund balances which show as equity but are not spendable. So that's always an important factor to keep in mind as you're going through the numbers and making your decisions.

6.2. Presentation, discussion and possible action by Video Wall Solutions regarding acoustic upgrades to the Fernley Council Chambers.

Mike Petracca, Trewth Solution, gave an update and review of the audio/video system in the Chamber explaining the next step is the acoustic panels. The acoustic panels are going to be completed when we have the room finally tuned, so we know exactly where we want them to be to help with the echo. The system can expand to accommodate boundary microphones that can be placed anywhere. There's a proposal in front of John Cleven, IT Coordinator, for the portable microphones. The benefit of that is you simply take the device out of the charger, and place it wherever you want it, and it'll work in the room.

Councilwoman Zoberski asked about the current hearing devices being compatible with the new system.

Mike Petracca stated that the assisted listening devices still work on this new system. They are old and are not hearing aid compatible. He suggested looking into devices that are hearing aid compatible.

7. ITEMS REQUESTED BY MAYOR OR CITY COUNCIL MEMBERS

7.1. Possible Action requesting a future agenda item creating a recreational committee. (Councilman Lau)

Councilman Lau stated it's time for Fernley to get a Parks and Recreation committee to assist with all the youth and adult sports activities in the city. There are not many adult sports, so maybe this committee can help promote these sports. The committee can also help with the softball league, their tournament and the Pop Warner football program. They can assist in giving the city advice on parks. They can also help give us advice on solutions to the vandalism problem that we have in our parks. They can help promote youth and adult sports tournaments in the area. It is also time for Fernley to find ways for adult sports. The committee can help inspire sporting clubs to come to our area, like a snow skiing club. The parks and recreation committee can also give advice regarding the future phases of the ERC. This will help to get more citizens involved in our community.

Councilwoman Zoberski expressed concern about it interfering with the new online park rentals. She also would like to know who we want on the committee.

Councilman Lau stated that we would like to have a mix of Council people, and the head of a few sports organizations.

Barry Williams, Public Works Director, stated the Public Works Department would be able to work with any committee that was formed.

Councilman Albert Torres stated that his basic concern is what the impact would be on staff's time.

Barry Williams, Public Works Director, stated that it is hard to tell at this point, since we don't know what the actual scope of the committee would be. A determination would be made as we move forward.

8. ADDRESS REQUEST(S) FOR FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS

Councilwoman Felicity Zoberski requested that the city do a roundtable where we're able to give developers, builders and contractors a idea of what our development code looks like. Right now, with the different waivers in different parts of the city, some of our developers, builders and contractors are confused about what our guidelines are. We're amending a lot of things within the development code.

Councilman Ryan Hanan would like to have the water rate study brought back and if there will be a freeze on the increase until the report.

Barry Williams, Public Works Director, stated that the report is expected in January, but could be any time between January and April. If a freeze on the 3% increase in January was made, that vote would have to have taken place in November for it to be effective January 1st. We wanted to wait until the rate study was complete. We had all the information to see what our capital outlay would look like in the next 5 years before we decided if we wanted to freeze the rates, or if we needed to make adjustments.

Councilman Albert Torres stated he is in favor of waiting for the rate study before freezing rates.

Councilman Stan Lau stated he was in favor of bringing back the rate study.

9. PUBLIC FORUM

Fran McKay, Fernley resident, stated that she agrees with Councilman Torres and some of the others. We have a lot of new people here, and they don't understand we've got some plumbing issues all over this town in the very old sections of town that need replacement.

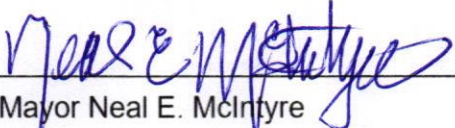

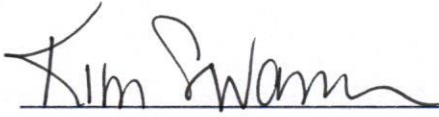
10. ADJOURNMENT
